RESULTS OF HEAVY EVENTS IN MAJOR UNITED STATES SCOTTISH GAMES: 1976

Bill Anderson, Aberdeen, Scotland, won the second Annual United States National
Heavy Events Championship in Santa Rosa, California edging Brian Oldfield 38 pts.
to 32 pts. Ed McComas won major titles at the Delaware Highland Heptathlon
(Fair Hill, Md.), Delco (Devon, Pa.); Grandfather Mtn. (Linville, N.C.); Virginia
(Alexandria, Va.); Stone Mtn. (Atlanta, Ga.); and Alma (Mich.). Fred Vaughan won
at Dunedin (Fla.); Ellerbe Springs (N. C.); and Charleston (S. C.).

Putting the Stone: Thrown from behind a four foot trig with a seven foot six inch approach. Inasmuch as competitive stones vary from 16 lbs. to 22 lbs. and more, and because the 17 lbs. stone is thrown in more U. S. Games, only it will be considered here.

Throwing the 28# Weight for Distance: With one hand only from a nine foot approach, behind a four foot six inch trig; a metal weight to which a chain and ring are attached and over all length not to exceed eighteen inches.

Heavy Hammer: Thrown Scottish style; a 22# metal ball on a Hickory or cane shaft, total length not to exceed 50", and thrown from behind a 4' trig in such a manner as not to allow the feet to move until the hammer leaves the hands.

Sheaf Toss: The Sheaf is a 16# bag of straw or hay which is thrown, by the use of a pitchfork, over a crossbar (similar to that used in the Pole Vault). In most American Games a Foul is called if the bar is touched or knocked off. The Sheaf is thrown at a majority of Southern, Middle Atlantic and Northern Games. There is no recognized record in this event as it is not a regular part of Heavy Events competition in Scotland. Three throws at each height.

In the future, any Canadian or other U. S. Scottish or Highland Games results will be appreciated if such Games include at least five (5) of the Heavy Events; otherwise they are not a true test of over-all competitive efficiency, as in all

of the above mentioned Games each athlete is expected to compete in most if not all of the seven to eight events. It is hoped that with better reporting of Games results it will be possible to present a more comprehensive standings in 1977.

Because of lack of information on most foriegn efforts by American athletes only the best throws in the United States have been considered here.
