The Heavy Events attracted eight competitors in both the amateur and open classes. For the third year in a row, Dick Shelton of Santa Clara won the Amateur class, this year with six first places including two records (in the light and heavy HAMMERS). His hammer throws were good enough to have placed fourth in the open competition. Shelton was provided some strong competition from Jan DeSoto of Santa Rosa and Bob Mackay of Turlock, CA who won both stone tosses.

For the third year, through the joint sponsorship of Ballantine Scotch and the S.F. Caledonian Club, Bill Anderson, Scottish and World Champion was able to attend the Games. Also returning were Colin Mathieson of Australia, former World CABER Champion; Brian Oldfield of Sunnyvale, CA, Professional World SHOT PUT Champion; Keith Tice, Clovis, CA, U.S. Scottish HAMMER record holder; Fred Vaughan, N. Myrtle Beach, SC, U.S. record holder in the 28 & 56 lb. WT throws and Gordon Varnedoe of Oakland, CA, former Santa Rosa Games CABER Champion. Ron Short, Winston Salem, NC, the U.S. Heptathlon Champion and top U.S. CABER thrower made his second appearance since 1975 and Dave Frazier of Venice, CA, rounded out the field.

Bill Anderson won the Championship again, this time with five Firsts (one record) and a 12 o'clock throw in the Ballantine Challenge CABER (19' x 140 lbs). Brian Oldfield finished second to Bill for the Championship and won three Events including two new records.

Around 4000 spectators witnessed a fine competition among twelve heavies with Ron Short of Winston-Salem, NC, emerging victorious for his second overall championship of the year. Ron had two First places including a fine 69' 2 3/4" win in the 28# WT and was the only competitor to turn the CABER (3X; 12:30-12:00-11:00; 18' x 130 lbs).

Other Event winners were Tom Johnson (Mt. Pleasant, SC) in the 20# STONE (42' 4") and Peter Hoyt (Altamonte Springs, FL) in the SHEAF (21', on fewer misses). Ed McComas of Lutherville, MD, placed Third in the overall only five points back.

Flora MacDonald Highland Games, October 7, Red Springs, NC

Events were Gates Harris and Jimmy McKellar.

Although 1978 was the second year the heavy events were held at the Flora MacDonald Games, this year's competition was quite good with throwers from North and South Carolina, and Quebec, Canada. Fred Vaughan won Outstanding Athlete honors with three First and four Third places including a 37' U.S. record in 56 lb WT FOR DISTANCE which broke his own field record set last year with the Charleston weight. Ron Short was second in the overall standings with a fine showing of seven Seconds.

Dave Harrington, Ottawa, Quebec, in his second Games of full Heavy Event competition set records in the HEAVY HAMMER (81' 6 1/2") and LIGHT HAMMER (109' 4 1/2") and paced Third in the overall. Another relative newcomer to the Games was Tom Johnson of Mt. Pleasant, SC who, although successful in the STONE competition at Charleston for the last three years, has now decided to try some of the other Games. Tom won the STONE with a new field record of 44' 4''.

Veteran Arnold Pope, Fayetteville, NC, secured an upset win in the CABER competition.

Excellent conditions including clear sky, calm wind, 97° and good grass throwing surface contributed to several personal bests among the athletes including one world record and two U.S. bests.

Gordon Varnedoe did a superb job in announcing the Games, not only through announcing the results of the Events but by constantly exposing the small (200+) but enthusiastic crowd to historical and other informative facts about the Highland Games. John Ross, still recovering from a leg injury, entered the STONE, HAMMER, and WEIGHT TOSS and did a fine job judging the CABER.

Brian Oldfield, in his best performance in a Scottish Games, threw personal records in all five of the throwing events including a new World record in the 17# STONE and a new American record in the 56# WT. TOSS. After a 58' 8" toss in the 17# STONE (better than the old record set at Santa Rosa, CA in September), Brian took a fourth throw and hit 62' 11 3/4". He next had a P.R. in the LIGHT HAMMER but lost to Tice. In 56# WT TOSS, Brian continued his record breaking with a 15' 7" throw, clearing the bar by at least 2" and breaking his own U.S. best of 15' 6" at Santa Rosa (1977).

The CABER (18' 3" X 115#) was successfully turned by only one thrower, Keith Tice, and after four Events the overall score was tied between Tice and Oldfield. In the 56# WT FOR DISTANCE, both Dick Shelton and Oldfield threw personal records; the lead changed twice between Tice and Oldfield but Brian mustered out a third toss of 34' 5" to win. On a fourth attempt Brian threw a very good 36' 9 3/4". Tice won the BEER KEG TOSS and the score was once again tied, leaving the final Event, a second CABER to decide the championship. All four competitors turned the 16' X 120 1b CABER but Oldfield scored 2-12:00 and 1-11:00 to edge Tice. Twenty-five points to twenty-four points for the overall.

Many thanks to Gordon, Dick, John and Brian for coming down to put on a first class Scottish Games competition for the students of Gateway High School.

On this beautiful Autumn day, many of the best Heavies in North America met at Stone Mountain Park for the Annual Finale to a season which for many began last January. As should be expected of a year's ending competition, the performances were often very good and very close. Ed McComas (Luther-ville, MD) won over a field of nine athletes taking Firsts in the HAMMER and SHEAF TOSS and Seconds in the 28, 56 and CABER.

Fred Vaughan (N. Myrtle Beach, SC) placed second to Ed's 30 Pts with three Firsts, two field records, and 28 Pts. Vaughan threw the slightly too long (20") 56# WT 38' 10 1/4", breaking his own field record of 36' 2" set in 1976 and threw 14' 4" to break Bob Porterfield's 1975 56# FOR HT record of 14' 3".

Ron Short (Winston-Salem, NC) scored 25 Pts for third Overall and won the CABER with three tosses of a 19' 6" X 115 lb log. Fourth place went to Tom Johnson (Mt. Pleasant, SC) behind a first place in the STONE. Rounding out the field were Dave Harrington of Ottawa, Montreal; Pete Hoyt, Altamonte Springs, FL; Michael Reid, Monkton, MD; George McAulay, Bahamas; Gordon Varnedoe, Oakland, CA and Chauncey Wallace, West Palm Beach, FL.

Some fine amateur performances, led by Larry Satchwell also helped contribute to a good show. The Heavy Events were contested continuously from 9:30 AM to 4:30 PM except for a 30 minute lunch and several hammer handle repairs.

PUTTING THE STONE: Thrown with one hand from behind a four foot six inch trig (toeboard) with a seven foot six inch approach. The stone varies in size from 16 to 32 pounds. Each putt shall be measured from the point of the trig where the putt is made to the nearest break of ground. The touching of any part of the trig (except the face nearest the competitor when he takes his stance) or the ground beyond the trig shall be a foul. The same stone should be used from year to year on the same ground.

THROWING THE 28# WEIGHT: With one hand only, from behind a four foot six inch long, six inch wide toe board (or trig) with a nine foot approach allowed. Same foul rules and throws as the STONE. Measurement should be made from a point on the side of the trig closest to the thrower nearest to which his throwing or plant foot was placed (left foot if a right handed thrower); to the nearest break of ground of the weight (not the ring). The weight is a ball or block attached by chain to a ring or triangular handle. The overall length of the implement should not exceed 18".

SCOTTISH HAMMER: The hammer head shall be of metal, a spherical, and the shaft shall be of wood or cane. Overall length of the hammer shall be 50" and the gross weight shall be either 16# (light hammer) or 22# (heavy hammer). Thrown standing style, delivered from behind a straight wooden trig 6 inches high and not more than 4 ft 6 inches long. The best of three throws by each competitor to the nearest break of ground. Fouls are counted the same as in the STONE and WEIGHT THROWS. Boundary pins are not necessary nor desirable, except on uneven ground. The same hammer should be used from year to year at specific Games to facilitate a fair ground (field) records system. From the time the hammer is returned to the trig, A competitor shall be limited to a time limit of two minutes for each throw...S.G.A. Yearbook, 1978.

TOSSING THE 56# WT FOR HEIGHT: (The Weight Over the Bar). A block or ball weight to which a ring or triangular handle is attached by chain link and weighing a total of 56 lbs is thrown with one hand only over a bar similar to that used in the pole valut. Competitors are allowed three throws at each height and may commence throwing at any height so desired but once having done so must continue. All measurements should be made from the ground to the top of the bar at a point midway between the uprights.

TOSSING THE CABER: There is no standard size or weight of caber but generally the caber should be from 17 to 20 feet in length and weigh 100 to 130 pounds. The practice of throwing a short, light "caber" for distance is not tossing the caber and should be discontinued. No trig or stance should be used, each competitor taking any length of run he wishes and tossing from where he chooses. Each competitor is allowed three attempts - the best of three to count. An attempt shall commence when the caber is set up and if the competitor allows the caber to fall, this shall count as one of his attempts. A perfect CABER TOSS is a 12 o'clock throw after the caber turns 180° and lands - not bounces - and stops. It is absolutely essential to have a competent judge, who thoroughly understands the rules of this sport.
